1. Background Introduction

1.1 The Irob Development Association

IDA stands for the abbreviation of Irob Development Association. It is a non-governmental, non-political and non-profit association established to help the rehabilitation and sustainable development of the Irob ethnic minority in Northern Ethiopia - eastern zone of Tigray. It was officially established with the approval of the Tigray Regional Government of Ethiopia on August 2003 in Mekelle, the capital of Tigray. It is an initiative taken by Irob citizens in Mekelle city after realizing the severe deterioration of livelihood of the Irob people at home in the country side followed by the devastating Ethio-Eritrean war and harsh environmental degradation challenging their agriculture-led livelihood. The association is established with ambitious plan of embarking on various interventions. However, due to lack of capacity, it could not aggressively realize its ambitions. Therefore, the Irob Scholarship and Educational Support Program (ISESP) in line with the dream of the association through its long-term impact in Irob society, is a revitalizing in addition to it.

1.2 Irob Scholarship and Educational Support Program (ISESP)

The Scholarship and Educational support program is officially launched on March 2012 and running under the directives and legal authorization of IDA (Irob Development Association). It has its locally administering voluntary committee, its operational guidelines (both administrative & financial) approved and monitored by IDA, working plans and fund-raising strategy. This program is specially tailored to address and support the Irob Educational sector which is in a very poor performance and therefore of failing the generation continually. Despite, its age of only months, the program has earned tremendous appreciation and support both from people at home and abroad which is really an evidence for its importance.

The program has committee its members are in different parts of the world and Ethiopia. This committee will give direction and create the necessary unity and commitment among Irobs all over the world while searching different opportunity for success of this program. The local committee which includes some members of the committee who may be available locally will have other persons from Irob who might be able to mobilize resources plus administer the resources. However, they are expected to discharge their duties and responsibilities with strict adherence to laid guidelines and in close consultation with the stirring committee. The appointed persons will serve for free unless the all members of the board decides otherwise depending on the resources available and nature of task they may be assigned to do at certain point in time. Therefore, in clear terms, these people are expected to give their free service to the community through serving in this program. The term of their work shall be three years.

1.3 ISESP Vision, Mission, Values, General Objective and Specific Objectives

1.3.1. Vision:

To produce and see Irob professionals' being internationally competent and outstanding intellectuals and having problem solving capacity based on scientific mechanisms.

1.3.2 Mission:

This program aims empowering of Irob minority through education opportunity by creating an army of intellectuals, servant and creative leaders who are well equipped out of current and next generations. The Irob youth will have both profession and passion to engage them in solving those chronic problems the community faces thereby also contributing to the transformation of Ethiopia.

1.3.3 Values: This initiative and those who will work in it shall always uphold and promote impartiality, truth, sense of justice and stewardship of the resources and brotherhood, integrity, transparence, and dedication to the goals of the program. The principle of non-discrimination on any grounds such as: gender, blood relation, religion, political orientation, zoning, is strictly forbidden.

1.3.4 General Objective

It is to promote and support educational excellency and advancement of Irobs at different educational levels, in a way to combat poverty and to produce professionally competent and outstanding Irob intellectuals.

1.3.5 Specific Objectives:

- To provide scholarship opportunity to those Irob young students, who are academically and professionally promising; have sense of commitment to their community and country, which otherwise have no other opportunity to further their studies at postgraduate level.
- To motivate outstanding/ (100 top) students in different Irob Woreda at different levels in Universities,
 Primary, Junior and Secondary schools, to give the rewards (1 dictionary, 12 exercise books, and 48
 pens that was expected to help for one year for school materials), roughly this costs 600.00 Birr yearly
- To support poor 60 needy students in total (20 each year) of public schools by giving birr 2,000.00 based
 up on the needs in the ground and requests from the administration and education office of the Woreda
 yearly.
- To support 1st, 2nd and 3rd year 20, 25 and respectively male top students and 1st, 2nd and 3rd year 10, 15 and 20 top female students attending their studies in public universities in 1st degree level; by giving birr 300.00 per month.
- Provide sponsorship to long term training to **21** female teachers on Mentocery program (KG program)
- Support Irob Woreda educational performance by supporting outstanding performing teachers yearly
- Awarding scholarship to 6 post graduate studies: 4 within the country and 2 outside the country

1.4. General Guidelines of ISESP

- 1. Only those set merits under the 'criteria' below are the basis to grant a support or give scholarship grant.
- 2. The responsible committee must be fair at all times. External influence or blood relation or any other conditions should not influence the decisions on the scholarship or support allocation. If there happens obviously deserves cases, however, may not be deprived of the support only because they are related to someone provided they fulfill other criteria.
- 3. A report of every activity and process should be and will be reported to the Irobs through appropriate media periodically (at the end of every semester).
- 4. The scholarships or other support are always to be announced publicly and attract applications and other supporting documents to qualify for the support of any sort.
- 5. Only legally testified and certified certificates and documents are acceptable and shall be a ground for any ISESP grant provision.

2. Irob Wereda (district) profile:

2.1 General overview of Irob Wereda

Irob District is located in north east of the eastern sub-region of Tigray. It is bordered by Ertreia from Norh, Afar region from east, Saesietsadaemba from south and Glomekeda from waste. It is 42kms dive from Adigrat twon. The land mass of district covers about 850 square km with arable land of 1,269.6m2, grazing land of 2854 m2, 4092 m2 free grazing land, 14640.5 m2 vegetatitive area, 28,085 m2 covered by cactus trees. The district administration is divided in to seven peasant associations and 28kushet or smallest administrative structures. Total population of the wereda is around 31,031 (15695 female and 15336male). There are about 6900HHs of 2931 are women heads. Under 15 years aged population of (0-15 years) constitute 49.73 percent .The age group between 15-64 years is about 47.02 percent while the old age (65 and above) population accounts 3.25 percent. Economically 90% of the population is based on agriculture.

Geographically set up of the district is high land and plateau interspersed in low-lying hills and flat lands. It is located in the far north east between 39° 28' to 39° 59' E longitude and 14° 22' to 14° 40' N latitudes. The topography of Irob district is characterized by extremely rugged steep-slope terrain and deep narrow valleys. The climate is generally dry with significant temperature gradient along the altitude ranging from 5°C-37°C. The altitude from lowest 900 (Endelly) up to the highest 3200 (Mount Asimba) meter above sea level but the majority of the territory ranges between 1500 to 2700 meters above MSL. It has three climatic condition which are Woina dega, high land, & low land, which accounts for 75 percent, 15 percent and 10 percent of its territory, respectively. During the dry season, the days are pleasantly warm and the nights are somehow cool; in the rainy season, both days and nights are cool relatively. There are two rainy seasons namely the 'Belg' and 'keremt'. The rain falling in the Belg season is low for growth of plants as a whole but main rain season is Keremt where by some rain and moisture is available for plant growth. It is estimated that the average annual rainfall ranges from 148-384 mm per annum.

2.2 Constraints/Hardships in the district

- Low performance in education sector coupled with high drop out from schools
- Illegal migration young labor force to different parts of the world.
- Cliffs and Ragged topography (Terrain nature of the land topography)
- Very limited and fragmented farming land (Small land holding and very fragmented and scattered, on average the land holding is about less than 0.25/household),
- Erratic rainfall and sever moisture stress;
- Recurrent drought and the prevailing trend on climatic change is a big challenge of addressing water scarcity:
- Lack of saving habit(extravagancies) or too much expenditure in cultural events;
- Limited infrastructure of basic social services such as road, health, transportation etc.
- Severe environmental degradation.
- Lack of appropriate technology (limited initiative topographical area based development, and Limited supply of improved agricultural inputs),
- Very poor livestock extension services, and low per capita oxen ownership and poor socio-economic infrastructure development.

3. Planed Actions and activity description on Education

3.1 Relevance of the plan

Education is one among the social services that has been largely provided in the district by the government and Catholic Church. These days education is becoming means of survival for the communities because the livelihood condition of the communities in the district is highly dependent on the educated members of the community. Hence education concerns the future of the community. The Catholic Schools have been serving as a main source of vocations for the elite people in the district. Even though the government is trying to provide basic education for all, it will be years to cover all needs & demand of the education the area unless supported by non government actors and community based organizations and associations.

3.2 Activity Description

3.2.1 Scholarship In primary school and high schools programs

Scholarship in primary school and high schools programs will be the first priority until the financial capacity of the ISESP reaches in reasonably enough capacity to offer all type of the scholarship award. In high schools and primary schools, the support shall take place in form of organizing competition, awarding outstanding and needy students from various schools. Support in the form of materials and other initiatives will focus on secondary and primary schools like providing books, creating some academic motivation in various ways and so on, because ISESP believes that the basis for education should be strengthened.

- To motivate outstanding/ (100 top) students in different Irob Woreda at different levels in Universities, Primary, Junior and Secondary schools, to give the rewards (1 dictionary, 12 exercise books, and 48 pens that was expected to help for one year for school materials), roughly this costs 600.00 Birr yearly.
- To support poor 60 needy students of public schools by giving birr 2,000.00 based up on the needs in the
 ground and requests from the administration and education office of the Woreda.

3.2.2 Scholarship for undergraduate programs levels

Currently scholarships for undergraduate programs are the second priority of sponsorship program. The up-keep costs, educational materials' cost and transportation costs will be studied and updated each year. The result of this study will be part of implementation plan for each year by the local scholarship award committee. Within the country, 'transportation' means the cost of bus (road) transport for going and coming back at the beginning of a year and at the end respectively.

• To support 1st, 2nd and 3rd year 20, 25 and respectively male top students and 1st, 2nd and 3rd year 10, 15 and 20 respectively to top female students attending their studies in public universities in 1st degree level; by giving birr **300.00** per month.

3.2.3 Scholarship for teachers

This program aimed to motivate and support academically outstanding teachers' servings in different schools in Irob Wereda. This support will cover the cost of full sponsorship at public universities for diploma and above program. The implementation plan will develop every year after identifying reliable fund sources.

• Support Irob Woreda educational performance by supporting outstanding performing teachers. Roughly the cost per semester is estimated to be **10,000.00** per semester. Accordingly every year **20,000.00 Birr** is planed to motivate and support (award) most outstanding performing teachers.

3.2.4 Main Types of Early Childhood Care and Education

- Early childhood care and education programs come in many forms. We categorize these into three broad types: parental care, informal care (by a relative, nanny, or babysitter in the child's own home or in a babysitter's or family day care provider's home), and center care or preschool (day care center, nursery school, preschool, Head Start program, or prekindergarten). We focus most on the third category because a host of studies has found that children who attend center care or preschool programs enter school more ready to learn. As noted, this category includes many different types of programs, and it is important to distinguish between them. Most children in preschool or center care attend private programs, for which their parents pay fees. Low-income working parents may receive child care subsidies that offset some of the costs, and other families with working parents may also receive financial assistance through tax provisions, including the child and dependent care tax credit and the dependent care assistance plan.6 Some center care and preschool programs operate full-day and year-round; others, only part-time or during the school year. Preschool attendance becomes more common as children approach school age. Approximately 60 percent of four-year-old children are in care during the year before they enter kindergarten, up from about 17 percent in care before their second birthday.
- Accordingly to think about dramatic change in education development in the district is worthy to
 establish Monetocery program centers jointly with the government. This planed IDA-ISESP will
 provide long term training to 14 teachers from 7 tabis and wereda administration jointly with
 education office of Irob district will pay monthly salary to the teachers and establish the centers in 7
 tabis.

4. Activity narration of the program

4.1 In primary and secondary high schools

Focusing in grade 5-12 the program planed to motivate learning appetite of students, through giving respect recognition to competent candidates who stood 1st -3rd in their class and have average points strictly above 90 points. Accordingly the program will give 100 students rewards (1 dictionary, 12 exercise books, and 48 pens that will help for one year for school materials), roughly this costs 600.00 Birr. Based up on the needs in the ground and requests from the administration and education office 60 special needy students' will receive 2,000.00 Birr financial support and this is expected to help them to cover their house rent during school time.

4.2 Scholarship for undergraduate programs level

The program planed to motivate learning appetite of students in public university, and regular through giving respect, recognition and monthly financial support to competent candidates in the country. Accordingly three years plan will accommodate in total 75 (20, 25, and 30, for 1st, 2nd and 3rd year

respectively) top students attending their studies in universities in 1st degree level and similarly to encourage girls/ female students; for three years in total 45 (10, 15 and 20 top female students attending their studies in universities in 1st degree level will get monthly 300.00 Birr financial support. The transfer of money will be directly to their individual bank account. Note: A probability for top female students to get two rewards at the same time is possible (for example in 1st year, which is one of the 20 top and one from 10 top female students). Similarly every year three in total (6) disabled university students will receive 2000 yearly for transport and other needs help.

4.3 Scholarship for teachers

This program aimed to motivate and support best performing outstanding teachers' from high schools, from primary, junior and secondary school servings in different schools in Irob Wereda.

4.4 Mentocery program (KG program) scholarship

Provide sponsorship to long term training to **21** female teachers on Mentocery program (KG program) which roughly cost estimated to be 20,000.00 Birr per individual. Individuals will be selected jointly with Irob education office and Administration and agreements will be arranged among IDA-ISESP, wereda administration office and the candidates (teachers). Appropriate centers for the training will be explored together with education office of the district and training cost will be covered by IDA-ISESP.

4.5 Scholarship for post graduate programs level

During this program duration IDA-ISESP planed to provide scholarship to 6 post graduate students in total in three years time and of which 4 post graduate studies are planed within the country while 2 are planed outside the country.

4.6 Other Planed activities

Bisides this program planed to sponsor one research work in educational states of Irob district and it's solutions for enhancements. On tope of that to support saho writing and reading skill development it is planed to sponsor training in the area.

5. Source of budget and fund raising strategies:

5.1 Source of budget:

The starting point for the preparation of a budget is to identify the program's objectives and to link them to plans or strategies. It is important to identify the *limiting factor*, the amount of money of the available or the capacity of ISESP to undertake its activities. Therefore, ISESP identified the sources of budget for its program and will always disclose resources obtained in a way that can lead to maximum transparency and accountability to its members, beneficiaries, donors and any other voluntary contributors. The main sources are:

- a. Members voluntary and fixed periodic contribution.
- b. Fund from donors by writing project proposals.
- c. Fund raising occasions, such as diner parties, community mobilization,
- d. Higher institutions such as Universities and Colleges,
- e. Any other voluntary contribution.

f. Contribution could be in kind through donation or in cash.

5.2 Fund raising strategies:

Such kind of intention can never be materialized without financial and human resources. Human resources are available through volunteer services and networking of Irobs and the financial sources shall be secured from generous Irobs according to their capacity as we shall continue to create partners for this program. The possibility of making some income in some way will be explored in the future. The program will approach potential partners in order to secure the necessary fund for its scholarship and educational support activities. This will be done by preparing appropriate and up to standard proposals. The other strategy is raising funds locally from Irobs and friends of Irobs through dinners, meetings, pledges and through mobilizing Irobs and friends in Diaspora. This program may obtain some property and hire it out to generate some income for the objective of the program in the long-run. This methods and approaches will be planned, designed and shared among Irobs in due course. In this way, it is hoped that the program will raise significant resource for the achievement of its goals.

6. Implementation modalities of this year:

6.1 Beneficiary selection and requirements

- Irob wereda Education office with Administration of the district will select beneficiaries by provides full address.
- Awareness rising campaigns will be conducted by the district officials
- Rewarding occasions will be facilitated and arranged by Wereda Education Office
- All beneficiaries list with their photo will be posted to see if there is any compliant in the process by the Wereda Administration.
- All beneficiaries will open personal bank accounts

6.2 Money transfer modalities:

All money transfers will be through bank unless otherwise very few when situation demands
